

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Pennsylvania Young Farmers Association is to educate and promote the agricultural industry. **PYFA is a member organization of the PSCFO** and has representatives participate in the quarterly meetings. At the meeting March 18th, Lewisburg YF member Robert Pardoe was elected vice president of the PSCFO for 2024. The new president is Kim Paley, representing the Mushroom Growers of PA.

The purpose of the PSCFO is to bring all agricultural organizations together to discuss current issues and find consensus so agriculture can lobby the legislature with a common voice for greater influence. Issues of interest mentioned at the March meeting were country of origin labeling, rural broadband, commercial scale solar, the PA Milk Marketing board, and the Governor's budget proposals for agriculture.



The PA Department of Agriculture reports at each meeting. Cheryl Cook, Deputy Secretary for Strategic Initiatives and Market Development, spoke of issues they are working on: vector borne diseases and invasives, climate smart agriculture, small woodlot management, water quality, workforce development, broadband, and ag technologies.

Dr Laszlo Kulcsar, Interim Dean of Penn State College of Agricultural Sciences, gave an update on college activities. PA Farm Link's Tyler Hoffman gave a presentation on the mission and programs of the PFL, including their website which can link retiring farmers with new farmers looking to lease or buy farms. They also present many programs on farm transition and free online Farm Link Academy courses.

Representatives from the PA Cooperative Potato Growers- Nathan Tallman, and PA Livestock Association- Mike Firestine, spoke on their industries and issues currently facing them.

The meeting was followed by the annual Cornucopia reception, where many Representatives and "...issues they are working on: vector borne diseases and invasives, climate smart agriculture, small woodlot management, water quality, workforce development, broadband and ag technologies."

Senators attended to mingle with the ag community and PDA staff. Delicious PA products and good conversations were enjoyed by all.

WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND THE STATE

WESTERN VP REPORT

Anita Weimer

Howdy from your new Western PA Vice-President. My name is Anita Weimer. I was born and raised on a dairy farm near Rockwood, PA in Somerset County. I graduated from West Virginia University and am currently working with Intellectually Disabled people in Somerset County. I have been a member of the Rockwood PYFA for three years.

The Rockwood Chapter of PYFA had an educational 2023-2024 year. They opened their season on November 2, 2023 with their initial business meeting. Later in November the members toured **Van Grouw Farm** near Berlin to learn how they produce their cheeses. They enjoyed sampling the various flavors of cheeses after the tour and videos.

Classes resumed in January with a presentation followed by a question and answer session conducted by the PA Farm Bureau representative Megan **Hostetler**. Members were enlightened on how the Farm Bureau fosters relationships with not only farmers, but inform government officials who produce policies that benefit the farmers, and school students to educate the next generation on farm products and services. Next, Dr. Croushore, DVM discussed bovine reproductive technology utilizing visuals to the Rockwood group with a question and answer time. He explained some of the advances in technology which help farmers have stronger herds and healthier animals.

The following week was a County Meeting with our own State Representative Carl Walker Metzgar diving into detail as a representative of a highly rural area in Harrisburg discussing topics affecting farmers from animal drug regulations to whole milk offerings in schools to digesters, to energy production to farm stickered vehicles to name a few. The following

chapter meeting hosted Tammy Colt who explained the differences in weasels and why and how it is necessary to trap, photograph, video and study them for the good of the agricultural environment.

Officer Brian Witherite from the PA Game Commission started off February with a discussion on various facets of his work in the agricultural communities on everything from deer, to the various gamelands access improvements and management plans to various animal and bird habitat and restocking information, Next was **Kim** Peck from Laurel Hill State Park with a presentation on the various grasses and habitats being created for bees, other pollinators, birds, butterflies plus animals and how this is being accomplished. A detailed presentation on herbicides, the varying types, when and how to use them including licensing was given by **Doug Benford**. An interesting talk on "Shrink" in farming including a game which highlighted the bottom line shrinkage which can/does occur on a farm was the topic of Rob Singo. Melanie Barclay finished off February with a presentation covering various animal parasites - which species get which pests, what it does to their bodies, how they are transmitted and how to keep parasites under control.

Trinity Farms owners Paula and George run their non-profit farms to meet needs under "Commission on Hope" assisting those dealing with addictions and incarceration to better themselves by meeting needs and developing skills. The various animals alpacas, sheep, dogs, baby doll goats, donkey, etc. - an Air B&B including their "rent-a-goat" program were discussed. The Annual Ag Advisory meeting concluded the season of classes with the County Banquet in Berlin rounding out the year.

CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS

The conference began with the board meeting Thursday evening. Tours departed at 9 am Friday, beginning at **Bright Farms**, a hydroponic greenhouse with four acres of lettuce and basil under roof. Bright Farms has six locations in the U.S, with Selinsgrove being the largest.





This location supplies fresh basil and six types of lettuce year-round to the Philadelphia and New York markets. From seeding to harvest, it takes 14-21 days depending on the variety.

The next stop was **Weaver's Archery**, opened in 2008 by the Weaver family with a shooting range and store with all things relating to archery and bowfishing. Their busy season is July through October, but they are open all year with a techno-hunt room and archery competitions in the winter.





Members next traveled to **SUN Tech** school for a delicious lunch prepared by the culinary students.





This career & technical school serves Snyder, Union, and Northumberland counties with 19 programs available to mostly high school seniors. Students served as tour guides, beginning in the diesel mechanic program where students become state inspection certified and can do co-op programs in industry, preparing them for immediate careers. Other programs include cosmetology, health professions, HVAC, electrical, carpentry, masonry, and many others. All the students we spoke to were excited and happy to be there.

The last stop of the tour was **Old Mill Creamery**, where we enjoyed fresh made ice cream and a tour of their milk and ice cream processing facility. The family milks 60 cows, selecting genetics for A2-A2 milk which is helpful for lactose intolerance. The business is housed in a 190 year old mill in a beautiful setting beside the mill race.







The Friday evening banquet featured speaker PA Department of Agriculture Secretary Russell Redding, who reviewed the Governor's budget just released this week, emphasizing innovation, economic development planning, and site readiness for new businesses. The local school Superintendent and Principal were guests for the evening. Dr. John Ewing from Penn State College of Agricultural Sciences, Center for Professional

Personnel Development, also brought greetings, and the evening wrapped up with entertainment from the band Eighty—6.



The annual delegates meeting took place Saturday morning, with election of new officers for the year. Workshops filled the afternoon, with the first being Jonathan Guseman from the National Weather Service. He spoke on first frost and last frost dates, degree days, fire weather, and available resources from the NWS for rural residents, including WARN, Weather Awareness for a Rural Nation.

David Hoover from **Spruce Run Farm** has raised reindeer since 2015, currently owning seven. His busy season for agritourism events is November-December. He brought one of his beautiful, friendly animals to meet us.



The third workshop featured **Dave Hackenberg**, major beekeeper in the area. His bees travel to seven states, from Florida to Maine, and sometimes California. He spoke about colony collapse disorder, which was first noticed in 2006, and other diseases and problems for honeybees. He showed a film

which he appeared in that discusses the dangers of crop chemicals to bees.

Saturday night was the Annual Awards Banquet. Hoover Tractor LLC of Mifflinburg received the Agri-Business award. Lenny and April Wagman of the Hometown Eatery were selected as Honorary Young Farmers for their generosity in hosting the Mifflinburg Young Farmers meetings for several years. The Richard Hoppes Memorial Award was given to Steve Kline, long time advisor of the Mifflinburg YF Chapter and PYFA board member, and his wife DeElma.





New officers for 2024 were announced: President Anthony Dietrich, Past President Michelle Dietrich, President Elect Keith Weimer, Secretary Tammy Rentzel, Treasurer Ed Zug, PR Denise Leydig, Membership Debbie Zug, Eastern VP Linda Krall, South Central VP Jason Rentzel, Northern VP Matt Dersham, and Executive Secretary Betsy Huber. The Western VP will be filled by the board.
