

### **Blue Triangle Hardwoods**


It was very interesting the way lasers were used to get the most boards out of the logs. The kilns were huge where the boards

# Pennsylvania Young Farmers Educate the Public Name

Bedford, Pa.-The Pennsylvania Young Farmers Association held their annual winter conference on the week of February 7th. We hold several contests through the week. The Spokesperson contest, which judges the contestants on their agricultural knowledge and ability to communicate agriculture's message, is the most interactive contest we have. Hannah Wentworth and Tyler Claypool were the two contestants. Dwayne Hay, Kellie Goodman-Shaffer and Dr. John Ewing where the three judges who helped with this contest. The participants and judges visited the Everett Weis Markets store and talked to the customers about agriculture and where their food comes from. At the end of the event the participants picked one shopper and the Young Farmers paid for all of their food purchases. The shopper this year was Doug Otto from Shellsburg. Otto worked on his father's neighbor's beef farm when he was younger. When asked what he thought about the Young Farmers paying for his food purchase he said, "I don't know what to say. This is a great thing." Otto's food purchase was \$143.23. In the United States consumers spend 9% of their income on food purchases. This is considerably lower than every other country. It is important for consumers to know how important agriculture and their food are. This is why the Young Farmers hold the Spokesperson contest.

After the visit to Weis Markets the contestants delivered a five minute prepared speech on Colony Collapse Disorder. After their speeches the judges have five minutes to ask the contestants questions. Based on all of the information collected the three judges determined the winner. Tyler Claypool was the Spokesperson winner. He is from New Galilee and is currently the State Chaplain for the Pennsylvania FFA Association. Claypool won an expensive paid trip to Agriculture's Promise, a conference held in Washington, D.C. each year. Thank you to all of the judges and contestants.




# **North Central Pennsylvania Young Farmers Meet**

The tenth annual educational dinner meeting of the North Central Region of the Pennsylvania Young Farmers' Association hosted by the State College Young Farmer Chapter was held recently at Christ's United Lutheran Church in Millmont.

Carol Corman, North Central Region Vice President and National Young Farmer Educational Association President recognized the six chapters that make up the North Central Region - Lewisburg, Mifflinburg, Penns Valley, Selinsgrove and State College. Heather & Hailey Wasson, State College FFA member lead the group in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and Larry Harpster, provided the invocation.

Special guests for the evening were Candi & Krystal Wasson and State College Advisor, Paul Heasley who were speakers for the evening, PYFA President Jeff McClellan, PYFA President –Elect Bob Corman, past PYFA





State College Young Farmer Advisor Paul Heasley, was the keynote speaker. He talked about the educational activities he is conducting within his classroom such as: biodiesel, using the glycerin to feed deer and hydroponics. He also noted a project called "Children's Grow House" where elementary students learn about gardening, vining crops and gourds. Could not have been a better day to listen to an agriculture teacher than on National Teach Ag Day who was nationally recognized for receiving the Christopher Columbus Foundation award!

Candi Wasson, spoke of the events that they are conducting on their dairy farm. She stressed one must find their "niche" and she enjoys educating children about agriculture. Candi noted they like to visit the farm because "it is real." They have expanded from a seasonal market of pumpkins, sweet corn, and other produce to offering hayrides and corn maize. Weekdays are dedicated to school children and the weekends are open to everyone with offerings of homemade soup and applebutter by steam. A possible deterrent is insurance and one must have a good relationship with your township supervisors and code officers. The Wasson's also hold several fundraisers during the year. She concluded with "it's not what you take in but it's what you have at the end of the day."

#### GYF HITS THE ROAD

The Gettysburg Young Farmers were invited to participate as vendors in two recent local agricultural events. The first was the No-Till workshop held by the Adams County Conservation District at the Emergency Management facility in Straban township. Gettysburg Young Farmers was one of a dozen ag vendors who set up tables to demonstrate products or offer services to the workshop participants. The display was "manned" by Deb Kammerer, GYF advisor. Newly printed brochures about the Pennsylvania Young Farmers Association were available to interested visitors. There was also a sign up sheet to subscribe to the monthly newsletter. Several interested attendees stopped by to chat and sign up for the newsletter.

The second event was held on March 8 at Gettysburg High School in observance of National Ag Day. The Battlefield FFA officers did an outstanding job organizing the event to raise student awareness of local agriculture and careers in agriculture. About ten vendors participated including GYF. Local agribusiness GVM brought a mammoth field sprayer which was parked at the school entrance. Also greeting students as they arrived were two pens of cattle and a pony. FFA students from other local schools were invited to attend. Russell Redding, Dean of Agriculture and Environmental Science at Deleware Valley College and former Pa. Secretary of Agriculture gave a keynote address to the FFA students and guests.

GYF offered students, faculty and staff the opportunity to compete in an AgTrivia contest consisting of three questions relevant to Pa. agriculture. Participants who answered three questions correctly were eligible to enter the drawing for prizes. Two GYF members donated prizes for the AgTrivia competition. Debbie and Chris Smith donated passes to Smithfield Corn Maze and Marcia and Tim Brown donated a gift certificate to Brown Valley Market. Also Dan Wilkinson donated his time to stand at the GYF display, talk to visitors and run the AgTrivia contest.

## An Update From Hannah Wentworth

I am excited to have been recently appointed to the state Young Farmer's board.

I am currently spending time in New Zealand, learning more about their agricultural industry. I am taking classes at an agriculture college called Lincoln University on the



South Island. Some of my classes include Dairy Science and Plant Production Systems related to New Zealand.

Coming from a dairy farm, I love learning about the New Zealand's dairy industry. It is intriguing with its differences compared to the U.S. Everything is centralized around seasonal grazing. Milk production is predominantly measured in milk solids per cow and per hectare. It gets confusing being in the southern hemisphere, their seasons are opposite and they use the metric system.



Some fun facts about NZ's dairy industry are that 95% of their milk production is exported. They produce 4% of the world's milk and the average herd size is 386 cows.

I am the only American in my dairy science class of

about 60 kiwis (New Zealanders). In our first lab we visited the Lincoln University Research Dairy Farm. It was unreal standing in a lush pasture surrounded by kiwis with cows grazing and a beautiful mountain range in the distance. We discussed some current research; one study is comparing high and low stocking rates in grazing paddocks, the affect on milk production, pasture quality and the environmental footprint.

I look forward to visiting more farms while I am here and traveling around the country.

# "AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION IS SWEET" **Tour Descriptions**

#### Wednesday, July 11, 2012 - Educational Tours

#### Tour A: Hershey Food's Research and Development Center & Giant Center/Arena

Hershey Food's Research and Development Center: This will be a rare, behind-the-scenes look at how the company creates new foods, tantalizing flavors, evaluates ingredients from all over the world, finding the best way to package their products for shipping, and a lot more. Not a lot of folks get to see what goes on there, so this is one sweet treat!

Giant Center/Arena: A tour of the GIANT Center is your group's exclusive backstage pass to all the action! See the event level where the stars hang out, tour the HERSHEY BEARS® locker room, and feel what it's like to walk down the tunnel to the ice, watch the production team in action as they plan for game day ... it's all just a part of your experience at GIANT Center. This tour showcases the GIANT Center concourse, HERSHEY SPORTS, Bud Light Champions Club Lounge, various Suites, Interview Room, Video Production Room, and Press areas.

#### Tour B: Zoo America, Hershey Gardens & Milton Hershey School

Zoo America: ZooAmerica North American Wildlife Park is an 11-acre walk-through zoo that displays living plants and animals from five regions of North America, which is home to more than 200 animals of 75 species.

Hershey Gardens: Hershey Gardens is a 23-acre botanical garden and arboretum located on top of Pat's Hill overlooking HersheyPark. It was built as a gift from chocolate magnate Milton S. Hershey for his community and to honor his wife, Catherine.

Milton Hershey School: The Milton Hershey School is a private philanthropic (pre-K through 12) residential school in Hershey, Pennsylvania. Originally named the Hershey Industrial School, the institution was founded and funded by chocolate industrialist Milton S. Hershey and his wife, Catherine Sweeney Hershey. The school was originally established for impoverished, healthy, Caucasian, male orphans, while today it serves students of various backgrounds. The Milton Hershey School Trust, which funds the school, owns controlling interest in The Hershey Company and owns the Hershey Entertainment and Resorts Company (HERCO) which oversees many of the area hotels along with a theme park, HersheyPark. With over six billion dollars in assets, the Milton Hershey School is one of the wealthiest schools in the world.

#### Tour C: Capital Area Therapeutic Riding Association, Penn National Raceway

Capital Area Therapeutic Riding Association: CATRA is a nonprofit organization providing therapeutic horseback riding to people with disabilities. The program is run completely by volunteers who do everything from assisting at lessons to cleaning stalls, mowing grass, completing barn and office work. Over 100 riders receive lessons every week.

Penn National Raceway: This one-of-a-kind tour will feature a behind the scenes look at one of PA's finest industries, horse racing. We will tour the backside of the track, including the horse stables and testing barn. The race track veterinarian will be on hand to provide detailed information about the regulations required of race horses, including the origin of the "pee like a race horse" phrase. Groups on this tour will also take a look at the Hollywood Casino, including a floor tour and an inside look at the simulcast center.

#### Tour D: Huntsinger Farms Potato Fields, Masser's Potato Packing Plant & Millersburg Ferry

Huntsinger Farms Potato Fields: Started by Elvin Huntsinger, an innovator in the field of potato growing and packing, he was the first to pack potatoes in poly bags in the late 1950s. Tour the 80-acre farm featuring red, white and golden potato varieties. Tour the fields and witness the adopted technologies from European agricultural practices utilized to maximize the quality of the finished product.

Masser's Potato Packing Plant: A family-owned operation, Masser's combines eight generations of farming experience with today's newest potato farming technology to meet the demands of modern business. Today, the farm has expanded to more than 4600 acres, with potatoes, cash grain and hay being produced. The potato packaging and warehouse operations pack and distribute over 250 million pounds of potatoes each year.

Millersburg Ferry: While enjoying the scenic tour of the ferry, presentations will be made by the Millersburg Ferry Association, PA Game Commission, PA Fish Commission and student aquatic Specialist, Northumberland County Conservation district and Ned Smith Environmental Center. Alternative arrangements are made in case of extreme weather conditions.
